For this issue of the Newsletter, I thought I would share the speech I gave at the Poverty in the Hunter Rally on the 18th of October. I am left wondering what will it take to effect change, are we so immune to the issues of others? Over the last five years homelessness has increased in NSW by 37%.

Poverty is the Absence of All Human Rights.

We are at National crisis level of the impact of poverty on women, and women with children. Women experiencing Homelessness has increased by 9.5% nationally. This means there are over 49,000 women with no shelter, and a large portion of those women are over 55 years of age.



In the last financial year Nova has worked with 1213 clients.

Domestic violence was the main presenting reason for 505 clients, with 462 (a close second) citing poverty. We're just one service of four similar services in the Newcastle/Lake Macquarie Regions and statistics would be very similar across those other services. The government has known since 2010 that older women are becoming the face of homelessness and poverty, yet they've done nothing.

For Nova, in the 2018/2019 financial year, we worked with 100 women of who are aged 55 and over. Women who are sleeping rough or living in their cars. What kind of society are we? Women and children stay trapped in Domestic Violence relationships, having no choice. For them their only option would be if leaving is poverty and the real risk of homelessness.

We know from the Anglicare Rental Affordability snapshot that there are no rentals affordable nationally for people on Newstart, older single women in the ages prior to pension age fall into this category. With no prospect for work. 23% increase of Newstart recipients – aged between 55 and 64. We know that there are only 0.8% rentals affordable for sole parents on Centrelink. When did we stop caring?

This is the outcome of long-term gender inequality, we are currently at 14 % gendered wage gap. Let me remind you that it is 2019!

Domestic violence = gender inequality. Gender inequality = gendered poverty When did we stop talking about a standard of living?

Everybody deserves shelter, safety and a standard of living.

Shame on you Australia!

We can afford it, I am happy not to go to Mars! We cannot afford to do nothing. We need government to address the growing inequality and national poverty crisis. We need to alleviate the structural barriers. They need to apply a gendered and poverty lens to all social welfare policies. They need to work from a Human Rights Framework. They need to remember to listen to the community, they represent us! How dare we accept that there are 731,000 children living in poverty. How dare we accept that by the time single women reach 60 at least 34% will be living in poverty. How dare we keep women and children trapped in domestic violence relationships. Let Me Repeat – Poverty is the Absence of All Human Rights and that is just unacceptable. *By Kelly Hansen - CEO*

Community Investment Program

The project is nearly finished and will be great for summer, allowing children to play outside and be protected from the sun.

Local Clubs Grants

Helping Women Relocate

Nova are extremely grateful to three of local clubs: The Wests Group, Belmont 16's, and Toronto Workers and have each contributed towards a grant totaling \$26,000, to provide removalist services for women and children needing to move furniture and their belongings when starting over in fresh accommodation. Removalist's are a costly exercise, and when women often don't have access to a car, doing it themselves is an impossible task. So far, this grant has enabled us to assist 16 adults and 14 children move their furniture and belongings into their new homes. Thank you so much to all three clubs, this is such a needed service and a fantastic help!



A Wall of Broken Hearts

October 2018

was a nightmare month that saw nine (9) women murdered by men. Seven (7) of those women were murdered in the context of domestic violence by a current or former partner. There was no public outcry, the media and politicians remained silent. We at Nova were outraged!

We wanted to make everyone aware what was happening to women and children in our society, we wanted to honour these women and children, we wanted to make others as angry as we were (still are) and we very

much wanted **WOMEN** and **CHILDREN**'s lives to **MATTER**...and so became the broken hearts display.



Respecting cultural backgrounds and privacy of the women and children and their families while honouring them was a major consideration and is the reason no names are on the hearts.

As we were leading into the 16 days of activism against gender based violence we decided to make the display a part of the 16 days, however it soon became apparent that the display should be permanent as it was drawing the attention we were hoping for. Over the past 12 months countless people have stopped to look, read the ages on each heart and to take photos. Staff use these opportunities to engage with the public to provide information, further raise awareness and at times to listen to their own experiences.

You can't not see the display when passing Nova and it is confronting to people when they realise each broken heart represents a woman or child who has been murdered.

It is our hope that this display continues to grow community awareness about domestic and family violence, and maybe just maybe, the community will be increasingly vocal and insist on the changes needed that will ensure **WOMEN AND CHILDREN MATTER!** By Lee Liewes—Operations Manager

Helping a

Mother and Son

get mobile

Neri was born with a rare bone condition in her feet, that over the years had progressed to the point that it severely affected her mobility.

By the time we met Neri she was virtually incapacitated and even a walk to the local shops was absolute agony for her. It impacted her life in so many ways, and with a young and active son, it now restricted his life too. Unlike many mums,



Neri could barely walk her son to school, a trip to the beach was out of the question, as was fishing or a trip to the movies, without lots of assistance and severe pain. Shopping was virtually impossible too, as without a car of her own, Neri was unable to walk home carrying bags of groceries. The day to day things, not just the necessary ones, but also those for enjoyment, were just too difficult for her to manage.



When Nova put the call out for a mobility scooter to help Neri on our Wish List Wednesday Facebook Post, it came to the attention of Dale, the Manager at Local Mobility at Cardiff. Dale had a reconditioned scooter in stock and jumped at the chance to help out. With a quick overhaul, Neri's scooter was ready to be delivered and to say she was over the moon is an understatement. On delivery day, we met Neri at her local park where there were pathways for her to practice on, and after a quick lesson from Dale, Neri and her son were soon zipping along beaming with happiness. Neri tells us the scooter has given her a new lease on life, she's been to the Museum, Art Exhibitions, the Beach and now even finds shopping enjoyable.

"I can roam the aisles at my own pace, see what's available, and easily take it all home in the front basket" Neri says

With the help from transport staff, Neri's even been on the train, something that before was almost impossible for her to do. We can't thank the team at Local Mobility at Cardiff enough for all their help and assistance with this fantastic gift, with their generosity and assistance, it's been lovely to be able to help someone get their lives back the way this has helped Neri and her son.



Starting Over

after Family and Domestic Violence

Donna was referred to Nova from the Hunter Women's Domestic Violence Court Advocacy Service, as she had been experiencing Family and Domestic Violence at the hands of one of her adult children. Donna was able to be supported to implement the new tenancy laws using a Domestic Violence Tenancy Notice to vacate her property ,and was able to stay with family temporarily whilst being supported by Nova.

Donna was initially declined priority housing, however after an extensive letter of support outlining the full extent of her past trauma, her current family and domestic violence situation and her health and medical conditions, was submitted by her case worker, Donna was given a priority within the week.

With the help of Friends with Dignity a sanctuary package was created for Donna, as she had fled her previous tenancy with nothing.

This meant Donna was able to move into her new home knowing it was beautifully furnished, giving her a safe new haven to finally start living free from family and domestic violence.

Donna was supported by her case worker to implement safety plans around her new home, as well as education on the warning signs of domestic and family violence in addition to her housing.

Donna continues to work hard towards healing from her past trauma and we are happy to know that she is going really well.
